

The Municipality of Cumberland is like many organizations these days in that it has challenges recruiting qualified new employees. Sometimes, the solution is very close at hand – it just takes a little thinking outside the box and some innovation.

That was the case earlier this year when the municipality was seeking qualified building inspectors for its planning department. The past year has been one of tremendous growth within the municipal unit. The issue was finding the people to go over building plans and give them the necessary stamp of approval.

Enter Samantha Stewart and Cory DeWitt.

Stewart has been with the municipality for 11 years, working as an administrative assistant in the planning department while DeWitt has six years working the front counter at the Upper Nappan Service Centre. "I've had a lot of different roles with the municipality, but I really liked working in the planning department," said Stewart. Council Highlights 2023/24

As we turn the calendar from 2023 to 2024, it's an opportunity to share how busy the municipality has been in the past 12 months.

- Council recently announced a request for proposals to build new fire stations in Springhill and Parrsboro as part of the comprehensive fire services review conducted in 2022.
- Two major projects in the Springhill area the Athol Road and Junction Road rehabilitation projects – were completed in November.
- The municipality also celebrated the completion of the new library in Pugwash earlier this year and officially opened the facility at a ceremony in July.
- 2023 also saw completion of the first phase of a new park and playground in Parrsboro near the site of the former town hall.
- Council was very happy to provide more than \$800,000 in grants to organizations who are doing wonderful things to improve life in communities across Cumberland County.
- The municipality is partnering with NSCC on a study of coastal vulnerability along the Northumberland Strait and it is excited to work with the provincial government on taking full advantage of the geothermal potential in the former mine workings under Springhill.
- In November, we also celebrated 13 employees for their years of service to the municipality in various roles.
- · We also made several key additions to staff in the past year, including our new director of finance Aimee Hirtle, our new director of planning and development Glen Boone.

It really has been a busy and productive year within our municipality and 2024 is shaping up to be just as active.

Springhill Water Meters

A water meter is now required in every home and business serviced by Cumberland County Water Utility. Neptune Technology Group has been contracted by Cumberland County Water Utility to install water meters at Springhill properties.

A meter is necessary to accurately measure water consumption. Water rates based on actual consumption create equitable billing and encourage water conservation. Water meters help people manage their own household costs based on how much water use, which makes it fairer for everyone.

Springhill residents will receive a letter from Neptune with instructions on how to book an appointment. Letters are being sent out in phases.



Frequently Asked Questions

Do I have to pay for the

No, there is no charge for the meter or the installation during the project period.

Who is responsible for maintaining the meter?

The utility is responsible for any future water meter maintenance provided the owner takes reasonable precautions to prevent any damage to it. It is illegal to tamper with the water meter.

How do I recognize my water meter technician?

Every authorized Neptune technician is uniformed and carries identification, including name, photo, and ID number.

Can I install the meter myself?

No, Neptune is responsible for performing all installations. The technician will install the meter on your incoming water service.
