# **Junction Road Project Begins**

It's going to be a busy summer for infrastructure work in the Municipality of Cumberland.

One of the biggest projects in recent years has begun in Springhill with the rehabilitation of both Junction Road and Athol Road.

The Junction Road project will see a completely new streetscape with a new urbanized right-of-way, including sidewalk on both sides of the street, concrete curb and gutter and new asphalt. The project will see a new watermain as well as the replacement of the sanitary sewer along the right-of-way and a new stormwater system and replacing ditching with curb and gutter.

The Athol Road project will replace an aging water distribution line that extends for about a kilometre from McGee Street to Beaton Lane, replacing aging and smaller diameter water line that serves approximately 60 residents. It will also see street resurfacing from McGee Street to the former town boundary.





# Parrsboro Playground Nearing Completion

The Parrsboro Playground Project is one of several initiatives the Municipality of Cumberland is working on this year.

The playground will include an accessible artificial turf surface where three pieces of equipment will be installed. There will also be a large climbing structure and swings on a wood fibre surface, and a constructed play hill with slides and other features.

# Domestic Brush Burning FAQs

#### Do I still need to purchase a burning permit?

For Domestic burning of piles smaller than two metres by three metres and campfires, no, but you now need to check the burn restrictions map or phone line to see when you are allowed to burn.

For Industrial burning – yes – you do still require to obtain a permit if you are burning piles larger than two metres by three metres and will have more than two piles burning at once and are clearing land for building a structure, for agriculture or for blueberry burning over two hectares. Go to your local Natural Resources and Renewables office to obtain a permit.



#### Can I burn brush in the morning?

No matter what colour the map shows, there is no domestic brush burning permitted in Nova Scotia between 8 a.m. and 2 p.m.

# Some municipal bylaws vary from provincial rules – which do we follow?

Check and follow your municipal bylaws first. Your municipality may have a burning restriction that supersedes the provincial novascotia.ca/burnsafe map restriction. Municipal restrictions may include: the time burning is permitted, the type of burning appliance that is permitted, the location in the municipality where burning is allowed or not, etc. Open Air Burning By-Law 21-06 sets out the Municipal regulation for open air burning.

The Pugwash Library opened its doors on Feb. 5 and since then hundreds of people have been coming through its doors. The official opening is Saturday, July 29, from 1 to 2 p.m.

# Come celebrate the grand opening of the Pugwash Library

The Pugwash Library Grand Opening Ceremony is Saturday, July 29, from 1 to 2 p.m.

The library is open from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. that day and there will be a full day of children's activities, including crafts, puppet shows and story time.

The official opening, including the ribbon-cutting ceremony, will take place at the rear of the library overlooking Pugwash's harbour (weather permitting). Please note, the parking lot will not be available to the public for the day.

It is hoped representatives of the federal and provincial governments will be on hand to speak, along with Municipality of Cumberland Deputy Mayor Mark Joseph.

After years of planning, the Municipality of Cumberland decided last year to move forward with the project, committing approximately \$1.7 million to the \$2.198-million price tag. The community raised nearly \$600,000 and the library opened in early February. From opening day, hundreds of people have been flowing in to use the facility.

The library is much larger than its previous location in the former train station, allowing it to offer more programs than ever before. Already, there are two book clubs and a knitting club meeting weekly while there's plenty of space to meet and host events. If you haven't been into the library yet, it would be a perfect opportunity to see the building and what it offers.



# 2023/24 Budget

#### Residential and Commercial Tax Rates

There are three different tax rates: general, Springhill area rate and Parrsboro area rate. These tax rates are established annually for residential, commercial and resource properties.

All tax and area rates are per \$100 of assessment.



# Compost Dumpsters in Place for the Summer

Compost dumpsters have been placed in areas throughout the municipality so residents have a place to deposit excess green bin material over the summer months.

Check out the map for the one closest to you. These dumpsters are intended for green bin material only: bread products, coffee grounds, dairy products, damp & soiled paper, eggs & shells, food napkins, fruit & vegetables, leaf & yard waste, meat, fish, bones, paper food wrappers, paper plates, paper flour/sugar bags, paper towel, pasta, grains, rice, pet waste/kitty litter, pizza boxes, shellfish, small branches, tissues/ Kleenex, NO PLASTIC.



# Back to the Basics with Dual Stream Recycling

Dual Stream Recycling is where all recyclables are sorted into two separate bags. Paper products are collected in one bag and recyclable containers are collected in another.

# Come to Pugwash on Canada Day for the Gathering of the Clans

The Gathering of the Clans has become the traditional way to spend Canada Day in Cumberland County. It is a party, Scottish style, with piping, drumming, highland dancing, highland games, artisans, midway, concerts, food and artisan vendors.

Early in the morning, local and international highland dancers take to the Eaton Park stage for ScotDance sanctioned competitions. Lovers of Pipes and Drums will enjoy the ACPBA sanctioned competitions on the grounds of Thinkers Lodge. At the Cyrus Eaton Elementary School, steely muscled athletes, dressed in their kilts, toss the caber and compete in other heavyweight highland games.

When the pipe and drum band competitions are over, all musicians form a massed band which will march up Water Street as far as the Village Hall. Band prizes are then awarded. This will be at about 3 pm.

## Summer Composting Avoiding Pests

#### Use boxes or paper bags to keep your cart clean

Line your green cart with newspaper or use paper bags. You can also place food waste in a cereal box to help keep your cart clean



#### Freeze It

During the summer months freeze your organic materials. Place the frezen organics in your green cart on your collection day.



#### Any amount will do

Place your green cart out for collection on every organics collection cycle even if it's not full. The longer your cart sits with food in it, the more it's going to smell.
